S&B MINERALS CELEBRATES A DECADE AT THE PORT OF BELLEDUNE

Peat moss harvested on the Acadian Peninsula is the best in the garden but it requires something to ensure that the roots breathe. Since 2002, S&B Minerals import perlite, a volcanic glass that expands up to 16 times its size at high temperatures, becoming feather-light and porous. This allows the peat moss to breathe so roots do not rot.

Previously, mineral additive came in by train from Arizona and New Mexico. “In Belledune, we bring in perlite ore from Milos in Greece,” says Guy Germain, of S&B Minerals.

“Because of this, the peat mosses companies save a lot on freight costs since it can be trucked down from the port to them.”

“The main reason we chose Belledune was we needed a deep sea port and we wanted to be close to our customers. We’ve been very happy there.” The port is ideal for other reasons, including its location which gives quick access to north-eastern North America. Using the same ships, S&B Minerals is able to easily move cargo to their other operations.

STANDING UP TO BULLYING

BullyingCanada is an organization where young people speak out against bullying and victimization in order to do something about it. HELPING YOUTH ACHIEVE

A positive learning experience can mean a world of difference growing up and Junior Achievement helps.

"We deliver business education to students from Grade 3 to Grade 12 either through the in-school environment or after school," says Sharon Jagoe, a one-time participant and now Junior Achievement Program Manager for the Restigouche, Chaleur and Miramichi Regions. "Our goal is that all students be touched by a Junior Achievement program at no cost."

Participants network, develop business, public speaking, and team skills, and self-confidence.

"The goal is to educate the students in business and economics," she explains. For students from grades three to eight, programs are in school. From grades nine through 12, participants in the 18-week program actually run their own business. There are 78 different programs. The Port of Belledune contributed financially toward the in-school programs as well as toward the annual banquet to celebrate the entrepreneurial successes of the Junior Achievers.

PORT SUPPORTS RESEARCH

The Smurfit-Stone Public Library, which opened in 1967, moved to its present location in 2003. "We loan books and have access to any book in the New Brunswick library system and can order books at no cost," says Dayna DeBenedet, Library Director. The local library has about 43,000 titles in stock and has access to about a million books from across the province.

The Port of Belledune recently made a contribution toward a \$12,000 fundraising effort to enhance equipment and services at the library.
